First Lesson

Genesis 32:22-31

The same night Jacob got up and took his two wives, his two maids, and his eleven children, and crossed the ford of the Jabbok. He took them and sent



them across the stream, and likewise everything that he had. Jacob was left alone; and a man wrestled with him until daybreak. When the man saw that he did not prevail against Jacob, he struck him on the hip socket; and Jacob's hip was put out of joint as he wrestled with him.

2 Timothy 3:14-4:5

As for you, continue in what you have learned and firmly believed, knowing from whom you learned it, and how from childhood you have known the sacred writings that are able to instruct you for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. All scripture is inspired by God and is useful for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, so that everyone who belongs to God may be proficient, equipped for every good work.

In the presence of God and of Christ Jesus, who is to judge the living and the dead, and in view of his appearing and his kingdom, I solemnly urge you: proclaim the message; be persistent whether the time is favorable or unfavorable; convince, rebuke, and encourage, with the utmost patience in teaching. For the time is coming when people will not put up with sound doctrine, but having itching ears, they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own desires, and will turn away from listening to the truth and wander away to myths. As for you, always be sober, endure suffering, do the work of an evangelist, carry out your ministry fully.

Luke 18:1-8

Jesus told his disciples a parable about their need to pray always and not to lose heart. He said, "In a certain city there was a judge who neither feared God nor



had respect for people. In that city there was a widow who kept coming to him and saying, `Grant me justice against my opponent.' For a while he refused; but later he said to himself, `Though I have no fear of God and no respect for anyone, yet because this widow keeps bothering me, I will grant her justice, so that she may not wear me out by continually coming.'" And the

Lord said, "Listen to what the unjust judge says. And will not God grant justice to his chosen ones who cry to him day and night? Will he delay long in helping them? I tell you, he will quickly grant justice to them. And yet, when the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on earth?"

Welcome The Rev. Kelly Steele

Christ Church is pleased to welcome The Rev. Kelly Steele today as our guest preacher. The Rev. Steele works in young adult ministry (ages 18-35) for the



Episcopal Diocese of Georgia and identifies herself as a priest "in the wild" or "an investigator for Jesus" looking for church-avoidant people with whom to connect. She is actively involved in Emergent Savannah, a collective of individuals who desire to build and foster a beloved community in Savannah. She is also involved with Citizens Advocacy under the leadership of Tom Kohler. In addition she oversees Columba House

Savannah (the diocesan residential leadership program), teaches Education for Ministry, and works to develop other ministry projects. She is always looking for new conversation partners and to raise awareness about the riches of the Christian tradition. In her spare time, she plays women's roller derby in the evenings and weekends and lives in Thomas Park with her spouse, the Rev. Guillermo Arboleda (the Priest-in-Charge at St. Matthew's, Savannah), and a puppy Reina. The Rev. Steele is a 2015 summa cum laud graduate of Duke Divinity School, Duke University (Durham, NC) as well as a 2012 summa cum laud graduate of Duquesne University (Pittsburgh, PA) and is a native of

Pittsburgh, PA. "Because my roommate asked me to come with her on Sunday mornings," Kelly attended St. Joseph's Episcopal Church in Durham, NC and was confirmed there by Bishop Michael Curry in April 2013. She was ordained to the diaconate on November 14, 2016 at St. Paul's, Savannah and to the priesthood on May 21, 2016 at Christ Church by Bishop Benhase (see photo below).



The Rev. Steele adds, "I was not raised in the church. I was raised in an atheist/ agnostic family spanning several generations on my father's side. I was baptized as an infant because my mother said it was 'fire insurance' and my maternal grandparents insisted upon it. I began to self-identify as Christian in college after a series of late night discussions with a Christian peer who turned out to be too zealously conservative, but, who, nevertheless, prompted me to read the Bible. I began at Genesis and promptly skipped to John when things got weird — I think it was when Noah's sons uncovered his nakedness. Eventually, I had a moment of complete surrender to God and pleaded for mercy and for a realization of God's presence. That happened, and oddly enough, all the pent-up anger and resentment about the Church and church history was turned inside out and turned — miraculously — into love and patience toward even the absolute worst parts of the church and its history. Even today, I consider my long -suffering for the church's inadequacies nothing short of a sign of Divine intervention. From that day, my freshman year of college in 2010, I knew I would dedicate my life to the church. The Spirit blows where it wills."

The Feast of St. Ignatius—October 17

St. Ignatius is greatly revered in the Eastern Orthodox Church. He had a long

episcopate and was accounted as the second bishop of Antioch, which is in Syria. Antioch is a town in which the disciples were first called Christians (Acts 11:26). Ignatius lived in the day when one could probably hear first-hand accounts of St. Paul's teachings. We have seven authentic letters written by Ignatius to the early Christian assemblies. They are amongst the most valuable documents of the early Church. He had a profound sense of two ends – his own, and the consummation of history in Jesus Christ. In ecstasy he saw his impending martyrdom as a fitting conclusion to his long Episcopate.

St. Ignatius maintained that the Church's unity would always spring from that liturgy by which all are initiated into Christ through Baptism. He extorted, "Try to gather more frequently to celebrate God's Eucharist and to praise him. At these meetings, heed the Bishops' presbytery attentively and break one loaf which is the medicine of immortality." Ignatius regarded the Church as God's Holy Order in the world. He was therefore concerned with the proper ordering of the Church's teachings and worship. He was one of the first important defenders of the three-fold ministry: bishops, priests, and deacons. He wrote, "Flee from schism as the source of mischief. Follow the presbytery as you would the Apostles and respect the deacons as you would God's law. Where the Bishop is present, there let the congregation gather, just as where Jesus Christ is, there is the Catholic Church." The Roman Emperor Trajan ordered Ignatius, Bishop of Antioch, to be brought to Rome for public execution in 115 A.D. He was brutally put to death before a mob in the Colosseum.
