Epistle

Hebrews 13:18, 15-16

Let mutual love continue. Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it. Remember those who are in prison, as though you were in prison with them; those who are being tortured, as though you yourselves were being tortured. Let marriage be held in honor by all, and let the marriage bed be kept undefiled; for God will judge fornicators and adulterers. Keep your lives free from the love of money, and be content with what you have; for he has said, "I will never leave you or forsake you." So we can say with confidence,

"The Lord is my helper; I will not be afraid. What can anyone do to me?"

Remember your leaders, those who spoke the word of God to you; consider the outcome of their way of life, and imitate their faith. Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever. Through him, then, let us continually offer a sacrifice of praise to God, that is, the fruit of lips that confess his name. Do not neglect to do good and to share what you have, for such sacrifices are pleasing to God.

Gospel

Luke 14:1, 7-14

On one occasion when Jesus was going to the house of a leader of the Pharisees to eat a meal on the sabbath, they were watching him closely. When he noticed



how the guests chose the places of honor, he told them a parable. "When you are invited by someone to a wedding banquet, do not sit down at the place of honor, in case someone more distinguished than you has been invited by your host; and the host who invited both of you may come and say to you, 'Give this person your place,' and then in disgrace you would start to take the lowest place. But when you are invited, go and sit down at the lowest place, so that when your host comes, he may say to you, 'Friend,

move up higher'; then you will be honored in the presence of all who sit at the table with you. For all who exalt themselves will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be exalted."

He said also to the one who had invited him, "When you give a luncheon or a dinner, do not invite your friends or your brothers or your relatives or rich neighbors, in case they may invite you in return, and you would be repaid. But when you give a banquet, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, and the blind. And you will be blessed, because they cannot repay you, for you will be repaid at the resurrection of the righteous."

The Feast of St. Augustine of Hippo—August 28

St. Augustine (not to be confused with St. Augustine of Canterbury) is perhaps the greatest theologian in the history of Western Christianity. He was born in what now is Algeria in Northern Africa in 354. As a youth he struggled with many forms of religious identity, belief and morals, resisting Christianity be-

cause he felt it didn't give an adequate explanation of sin with a creator God of love. Under the influence of his mother, Monnica, he became a Christian in 386, and was baptized by St. Ambrose, Bishop of Milan. Ambrose's preaching was a great influence on Augustine. Soon after his return to North Africa, Augustine unexpectedly was chosen as a priest and four years later as Bishop of Hippo.

His spiritual autobiography, The Confessions of St. Augustine, was written in 400, a classic of Western spirituality. In it he confessed he



had been obsessed with his sin and guilt, yet prayed "Grant me chastity and continence, but not yet". He wrote countless treatises, letters and sermons, extensively on human sin. Was sin inherited from Adam or a personal choice? (See Articles of Religion IX p. 869 BCP.) He defended the Church from charges that the sinfulness of clergy invalidated the sacraments. He stated that the Church is holy because God is holy, not because its members could be proven holy (see Articles of Religion XXVI, p. 873 BCP). Perhaps his best known work is The City of God, where he writes that two cities have been formed by two loves, the earthly love of self and the heavenly love of God. The earthly city glorifies itself. The heavenly city glorifies the Lord.

St. Augustine died 28 August 430 as the Vandals were besieging his own earthly city, Hippo.
